The 2017 South Lewis Elementary Summer School Program ran Monday - Thursday, 8:15-11:15 a.m. from July 5 - August 3, 2017, for 5 weeks. Transportation was provided by South Lewis CSD buses.

## Our Summer Program goals were:

To provide an opportunity for students to avoid regression in learning in academic areas over the summer and to increase learning for at-risk students recommended by classroom teachers.

# Our process for inviting students was:

Teachers recommended students to be invited to Summer School Program. Invitations were sent to parents/guardians of recommended students. This was followed with all students in each school being invited. Permission to attend forms were completed by parents/ guardians, returned to school and students were registered.

### Incoming Kindergarten attendance:

We are especially pleased to have had so many of our incoming kindergarten students attend summer school. Not only do they begin to understand what will be expected of them as full time students, we begin to understand their personal strengths and needs. This information is invaluable to the kindergarten teachers who taught summer school and to administration. This knowledge will be shared with all kindergarten teachers as we begin school in September.

### Our programs consisted of:

Reading, Writing and Math were the main academic focus/foci. Technology was integrated throughout the program at all grade levels, especially through the use of the Smart Boards, ipods, ipads, desktops and Mac laptop computers. Children were given the opportunity for physical activity each day.

### Incoming Kindergarten focused on:

Readiness skills, letter recognition, beginning sounds, writing name, rote counting, writing and recognizing numbers, motor skills, listening and following directions, and the structure and routine of school.

### Incoming First Grade focused on:

Reading, writing, building sight word vocabulary, math basic addition and subtraction skills.

# Incoming Second Grade focused on:

Reading skills/strategies, sight words recognition, word families, vowel sounds, writing mechanics, and math addition and subtraction facts.

## Incoming Third Grade focused on:

Reading comprehension, gathering meaning from texts, writing mechanics, math time, money, place value, addition and subtraction to the hundreds, and problem solving.

# Incoming Fourth Grade focused on:

Reading comprehension, gathering meaning from texts, writing mechanics, math addition, subtraction, and multiplication facts.

### Report Card:

A Progress Report was completed and sent home for each child attending the Summer School Program. It covered Reading, Writing and Math Skills and Objectives progress and documented student attendance.

# Other Uses for Port Leyden Elementary School Summer 2017:

Port Leyden Elementary School housed the South Lewis Summer Program for both schools this year, Glenfield and Port Leyden. 8 classrooms were needed. This one location made for ease of consolidation of services and staff. Numerous service providers for OT, PT, Speech and SEIT services used our facility to provide summer services to classified students. Port Leyden Elementary was also one location that distributed the free breakfast and lunch for children ages 3-19; thanks to the South Lewis School partnership with the Food Bank of Central New York.

We would like to thank the South Lewis Central School Board of Education for the opportunity to have another successful and productive summer school session this year. We find the opportunity to work with these students in an alternative setting to be extremely beneficial for student success into the future. Summer school provides the opportunity for the teachers to focus on skill development in areas that many students struggle with such as, reading, writing, math, critical thinking and problem solving skills. It is our intent to help the students develop the skills necessary to be successful in all of their content areas. The following are specific examples of activities that students participated in over the five-week period:

- Egg Drop Challenge
- Discussed character education and bullying.
- Explored Google Drive and Google Classroom.
- Wind Blade Challenge
- Road Trip Challenge
- Read current events on NewsELA

We would like to thank all staff involved in helping make this year run smoothly. Mrs. Luther and Mrs. Houghton provided daily communication with parents, organization with records and bus notes, and general logistical assistance in the middle school. Mr. Hanno and Mr. McDougal worked very hard to produce daily bus runs that got the students here flawlessly on a daily basis. Ms. Duppert gave each of us the academic freedom to be creative in developing a curriculum that was engaging and productive for the students. Once again, a special thank you goes out to the Board of Education for supporting such a wonderful opportunity for our students to grow not only academically, but socially as well.

Initially there were 49 students, who had signed up, with 45 students attending. On average, 35 students showed up each day. Many factors contributed to the

students not being here including family obligations, vacations, and attendance at summer camps. Students attending received weekly progress reports along with a final end of school AIS progress report. Parental contact was made frequently to keep parents informed of their child's progress.

#### **Driver Education:**

Our Summer School Driver Education program was very successful as always. Again this year, we had two instructors, Wayne Lyndaker and Marcus Bush, and 17 students (one of these was a homeschooled student).

Classes began July 5, 2017 and ended on August 15, 2017. Each student had 24 hours of classroom instruction, approximately 6 hours behind-the-wheel and approximately 19 hours of incar observation. Every student passed the course and received an MV-285 certificate from Mrs. Chaufty.

We had no students take Driver Education at Lowville Academy again this summer.

#### Academic:

Thirty-two South Lewis students took classes at Lowville Academy this summer (five of these were in both blocks). Twenty-one South Lewis students took Regents Examinations only (five taking more than one Regents).

#### **District Catalog**

This summer we provided faculty with 20 workshops faculty could sign up to attend. Examples of topics offered included: Mindfulness Training, Innovate with iPad, Google Suite, McGraw Hill's Digital Textbook, and Computer-Based Testing Modifications. Most of the workshops were facilitated by South Lewis administrators or lead teachers, including Laura Martin, Scott Carpenter, Laurie Yager, Lisa Monks, Kristy McGrath, Cathy Littlefield, and Danielle Abrial. BOCES professional development office provided 2 sessions, and Lee Vance from Rubenzahl, Knudsen and Associates Psychological Services provided 1 session. **240 attendees participated in the 20 workshops**.

#### "Extra" Proposals

We had 11 "extra" requests made by individuals and/or groups of teachers that were beyond the offerings mentioned above, and we approved all of these requests. Examples of "extra" projects included: 1-continuing to revamp and refine high school ELA and math lessons, 2-Photo Shop training for our new Photography elective, 3-preparation for the 1:1 technology initiative, and 4-refining Earth Science A curriculum for more engagement and scaffolding for students. **Approximately 178 hours were approved for the 11 "extra" proposals.** 

#### KIDSKAMP/Challenge Week 2017

#### Background

The first KIDSKAMP week took place during the summer of 1999, and was introduced in an effort to help our students achieve more in and out of the classroom. KIDSKAMP is a five-day summer program open to South Lewis students entering fifth grade. Similarly, the Challenge Week program follows the same structure and concepts as KIDSKAMP, but is open to students entering eighth grade. The long-term goal for both programs is to positively impact post secondary plans for South Lewis students.

KIDSKAMP and Challenge Week are formatted based on the research regarding the resiliency of children. Research shows that children who demonstrate an achievement-orientated outlook when confronted with challenges have learned the following:

- The importance of having dreams and aspirations.
- They are not limited by fate and circumstance.
- Challenges in life are to be confronted and overcome.

Learning these factors correlates with greater achievement at school, and positive character development.

#### **Summer 2017**

KIDSKAMP August 14-18<sup>th</sup> 5<sup>th</sup> graders-16 attended Challenge Week August 7-11<sup>th</sup> 8<sup>th</sup> graders-15 attended

#### Format

Monday: The theme of this day is developing a positive mindset.

Guest speakers are invited to campus to talk with students about strategies that might be useful in developing a positive sense of self, and a positive mindset. Challenge Week students were able to partake in a discussion and the practice of "mindfulness" with Lee Vance, and to discuss growth vs. fixed mindset with Mr. Chris Villiere. Kidskampers met with Ed Steckly, Former Mountain View Prevention Counselor, and Current Mountain View Prevention Employee, Simpson. Students engaged in future minded activities including dream boards and the "Bare Feet" project. These activities are designed to help students begin thinking about how they have to take ownership over his/her own success. Conversation ensued about how one has to put the work in and set/reach process goals so that he/she can eventually achieve a larger future goal. Students began watching "Hoovey"/ "Front of the Class" to start getting them thinking about overcoming challenges and adversities.

<u>Tuesday</u>: The theme is developing a positive orientation to challenge and adversity. Students travel to Beaver Camp where they participate in various elements of the Challenge Course. The course is a combination of fun and challenging activities that build trust, confidence, self-esteem, and teamwork skills. Students are presented with numerous opportunities to confront what they see as difficult challenges. The morning encourages group work, and the afternoon requires students to challenge themselves through high elements on the ropes course.

<u>Wednesday</u>: The theme is developing a positive orientation to challenge and adversity. Guest speakers are invited to campus to discuss challenges they have faced in their lives and how they have successfully overcome those difficulties. Students also participate in various exercises and discussions to help gain a better understanding of overcoming adversities. The purpose of these activities is to provide students with concrete, real life examples of people who demonstrate a positive orientation to challenge and adversity in pursuit of their dreams. Guest speakers included former South Lewis graduate and current Behavior Specialist Heidi Abbey, Olivia Kriwox (current South Lewis senior), Rebecca Garner, School Psychologist, and Retired ARMY Sergeant, Jesse Steele (featured in the nationally recognized book <u>The Outpost</u>). Students finished watching the movies from Monday and used the lessons from the film to talk about challenges/adversities they personally face.

Thursday: The theme is developing dreams and aspirations.

Students travel to various colleges where they are able to tour the campuses, and begin to develop an understanding of post secondary options. The fifth grade students visited Hamilton College. The Challenge Week students visited Colgate University for the first time this year. Fifth grade students had an opportunity to engage in discussion with Mrs. Phyllis Breland, Higher Education Opportunities Program (HEOP) Director, about future career and education goals, and the process of goal setting in efforts to achieve those future aspirations.

<u>Friday</u>: The theme is setting goals for this coming year and following through on these goals. This day is spent on campus and used as a time to bring the weeks activities together. The students are asked to develop one academic goal and one personal goal for the upcoming school year. Students also completed timeline/Bare Feet projects and shared with the group.

#### Additional Support

Mountain View Prevention Services has become an integral part of KIDSKAMP and Challenge Week. The Agency, once again, made Mr. Tom Bradish available to help plan and lead activities during both weeks.

Brooklyn Sullivan and Katie Vito volunteered their time to help mentor and guide students during KIDSKAMP activities. They were excellent at setting a positive example for the younger students.

#### Follow Up

Three times the following school year, students will receive a written letter from Erin Monnat, Elementary Guidance Counselor, asking them to think about some of the lessons learned during the week's events and to re-evaluate the goals that he/she set during KidsKamp/Challenge Week.
